

History of the Nativity Scene

Nativity scenes are depictions of the birth of Jesus, which can be a display of model figures or a live reenactment. The first nativity scene was created by Saint Francis of Assisi in 1223 in Italy. He was attempting to emphasize the importance of the worship of Christ during Christmas, rather than focusing on "material things". His nativity scene was a live reenactment with human and animal actors. The scene became quite popular and inspired many others to create their own nativity scenes, and they are still just as popular today.

Origin of the Christmas Tree

The origin of the Christmas tree can be traced back to the ancient Egyptians, Chinese, and Hebrews, who all shared a similar custom in using evergreen wreaths and garlands to symbolize eternal life. The Romans would decorate their homes with wreaths of evergreen during their mid-winter festival. The tradition of decorating a tree as we do around Christmas was believed to have started with pagan Europeans. The tradition survived through their conversion to Christianity and is one practiced world-wide among many different religions. The Christmas tree is something that symbolizes the celebration of Christ as well as the spirit of the holidays and has been a tradition carried on for generations over hundreds of years.
